Outlets for Laptops

More patrons can now “plug in” their laptops, tablets and other portable devices when seated at tables by the south wall of the Adult Department. In December, additional electrical outlets were installed under the shelving—the first of several anticipated changes for the department to reflect the many ways patrons are using the Library today. “More outlets” was a frequent request on the survey we conducted in 2011. Tumblebooks on iPad

TumbleBooks is an online collection of animated picture books that nurtures reading readiness in preschoolers and it is available on the Library’s website. (Patrons learning English find it a useful site, too!)

Since the online books were created using flash animation which iPads don’t support, Tumblebooks is starting a collection of non flash videos especially for the iPad. They have 44 iPad books currently available with more to come.

NLS Goes Digital

In 2011, the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped (NLS)—the Library of Congress’ talking-book and braille program—celebrated 80 years of helping visually impaired and physically handicapped individuals enjoy reading books and magazines.

This free library program delivers reading materials in digital audio and braille formats straight to the homes of patrons from preschoolers to centenarians. Books on digital cartridge, digital talking-book players, and braille books are sent to patrons via the U.S. mail at no cost to users.

The Westchester Public Library has a new digital reader to demonstrate their new technology.
